The actual formatting according to the Springer guidelines will follow *after* the conference. At this point, we only provide some rough guidelines. Feel free to adapt them as long as you keep your paper well and consistently structured.

## **Submission**

- Submit your paper in \*.doc format. The manuscript should additionally be submitted as **pdf** file with all the fonts embedded, especially if text or figures contain special characters or unusual fonts.
- Use a single **main font** for the entire text. We recommend *Times Roman*, 12 pt.
- For **special characters**, please use *Symbol* or *Arial Unicode*.

# **Structure and Headings**

Please use the decimal system of headings with no more than three levels. Additional levels of headings should be unnumbered.
